Internship Highlight with Braden Hargus III

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INTERNSHIP HIGHLIGHT

A DISCUSSION WITH BRADEN HARGUS III

Senior Recreation and Sport Management Major and Outdoor Leadership Minor, Braden Hargus III sat down with Anya Bruhin, Director of Outdoor Leadership to discuss his spring internship experiences at Coler Mountain Bike Preserve and Lacaida Ropes.

Braden's interest in outdoor recreation began in High School when he joined his school's mountain biking team. The Arkansas National Interscholastic Cycling Association (NICA) is a youth development organization and has teams all over the state and teaches students mountain biking skills as well as stewardship and conservation. "NICA teaches respect trails and fosters stewardship. It really sparked a desire to keep riding and exploring new spaces. I knew the etiquette, and had the confidence to ride and explore independently." NICA jumpstarted the journey making Braden more aware of conservation and leave no trace principles and has helped him grow greater respect for environment.

Braden added the Outdoor Leadership Minor in the Fall of 2023 and quickly focused on the biking and trail related courses; Bikepacking, Trail Stewardship and Management, Mountain Biking and Wilderness First Aid.

This focus led him to seek an internship opportunity with Coler Mountain Bike Preserve in Bentonville. Braden's role is part program support and part trail crew support. "The courses I took really set me up for success and gave me the experience I needed to be able to contribute to the Coler team and ultimately further my education in outdoor recreation." Braden says that while programming has been enjoyable, trail work is the most fun. He has participated in an invasive species workshop, and helped with some re-routing, water mitigation, and event course mapping. He finds the work satisfying and enjoys the feeling of riding on trails he worked on.

One of the most impactful aspects of the Outdoor Leadership program, according to Braden, is the focus on conservation. Students earn a Leave No Trace Level I Instructor certification as a part of the ODLR minor. That focus on conservation and environmental stewardship is one of the reasons why he values his experience at Lacaida Ropes. Founder Pedro Somarriba uses these principles in the production of his metered ropes, minimizing waste and environmental impact.

Braden has been learning about supply chain, rope production, online sales, patents, safety standards, and vendor networking while interning with Lacaida.

Working with a minority-owned business has been eye opening for Braden. He has gained an awareness for lifting up people of color and hearing their perspective. Braden acknowledges the privilege of being a white male in the outdoor industry. "Working with Pedro Somarriba at Laciada and Geo Velazquez at Coler has been a great learning experience for using my privilege for allyship. It's been great to bring new folks along and learn that you have an impact."

When asked what is next for this spring graduate, Braden says he is interested in:

- Outdoor industry supply chain with safety and pride in product based on experience and need for better equipment rather than pure profit
- Trail design and management at the state or national park level
- Event production and race course design
- Law enforcement ranger academy for park ranger and game warden roles
